 - You can retake them to try to improve your score.

 - act.org: information about the ACT test and requesting accommodations

ROTC

- Enroll in a 4-year college or university

Enlist

- Be 18 years old, or 17 with parent's permission
- Have a high school diploma or GED certificate
- Talk to a recruiter to find out more about the requirements

Work Experience

- You can learn a lot through working!
- Can be a good way for you to explore and learn what you like and don't like
- You'll also learn soft skills, like teamwork, problem solving, and time management
- Some companies help pay for college tuition or training

Apprenticeships

- Earn money while you learn
- Many industries offer apprenticeship program
- Programs last 1-6 years and your wages increase as you get more experience

Coding Bootcamp

- Complete training program for a career in technology
